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Amended Research Ordinances in the Light of UGC Regulation 2022

The ordinances regarding Ph.D. have been amended as per the Gazette of India November 07th, 2022 UGC (Minimum standards and process for award of M.Phil./Ph.D. degree) regulation-2022.

ORDINANCE FOR THE DEGREE OF DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY (Ph.D)

1. Preamble

Career Point University Kota, offers postgraduate programs leading to the award of degree of Doctor of Philosophy through its Departments/Research Centers. The award of degree of Doctor of Philosophy is in recognition of high academic achievements, independent research and application of knowledge under the faculties of Engineering & Technology, Computer Application & Technology, Arts & Humanities, Commerce and Management, Education, Law, Science, Library & Information Science, Health and Allied Sciences.. The academic program leading to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy is based on the University Grant Commission (UGC) Minimum standards and procedure for awards of M.Phil./Ph.D. degree Regulation 2022. The degree of Doctor of Philosophy shall be abbreviated as Ph.D.

The academic programme leading to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy is broad-based and involves a minimum course requirement and a research thesis. The University also encourages interdisciplinary areas through a system of co-supervision through its academic departments and research centers and provides excellent opportunities for such programmes. The University undertakes sponsored research and development projects from industrial and other organizations in the public as well as private sector.

The degree of Doctor of Philosophy shall be abbreviated as PhD. The degree of Doctor of Philosophy is granted for research work in areas recognized by the Academic Departments/bodies of the University subject to the conditions and regulations contained hereinafter.

The research work shall be an original work characterized either by the discovery of facts, or by a fresh approach towards the interpretation and application of facts, or development of equipment making a distinct advance in instrument technology. It shall evince the research scholar's capacity for critical examination and sound judgment and shall represent original contribution to the existing knowledge.

The degree of Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) of the Career Point University, Kota shall be conferred on a research scholar who fulfills all the requirements specified in these Ordinances and Regulations. The degree of Doctor of Philosophy will be awarded on the research work carried out by the research scholar.

2. Definitions

Note: 'He' and 'His' imply 'he'/'she' and 'his'/'her', respectively here after.

- **“Applicant”** shall mean an individual who applies for admission to the PhD programme of the Career Point University, Kota on a prescribed Application Form.
- **“Caretaker Supervisor”** shall mean a member of the academic staff appointed to look after the research scholar’s research interests in the absence of the Supervisor and after the submission of the thesis.
- **“Co-supervisor”** shall mean an additional supervisor approved by the Department Research Committee to help in the accomplishment of the research work of the research scholar.
- **“Course Advisor”** shall mean a faculty member nominated by the Department/Research Centre to chalk-out the programme of study of a student registered for the PhD and to advise him on the courses to be taken by him. If a supervisor(s) has already been appointed, he shall be the Course Advisor for that student.
- **“Course Work”** shall mean courses of study prescribed in the Department/Research Centre through the Course Advisor to be undertaken by a student registered for the PhD degree.
- **“Dean (Research)”** shall mean the Dean (Research) to be appointed by the Vice Chancellor. All the matters related to PhD degree shall be routed through Dean (Research).
- **“Degree”** shall mean the Degree of Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) of the Career Point University, Kota.
- **“RAC”** shall mean Research Advisory Committee.
- **“Full-time Research Scholar”** shall mean a person registered for the PhD degree devoting full time to complete the degree requirements.
- **“Minimum Registration Period”** shall mean the minimum period for which a research scholar must be registered, prior to submission of the thesis.
- **“Part time Research Scholar”** shall mean a person who is registered for the PhD degree and will devote part of his time towards this pursuit and devote part of time towards the discharge of his official obligations.
- **“CPU”** shall mean Career Point University, Kota.
- **“Registration Period”** shall mean the length of time span commencing with the date of initial registration at the University/Research Centre on full-time basis.
- **“Research Scholar”** shall mean a person registered for the PhD degree programme.
- **“Residential Requirement”** shall mean the minimum period for which a Research scholar must attend the University/Research Centre on a full time basis. All regular Phd students should attend 100 days.for the purpose of attendance certificate.
- **“Sponsored Research Scholar”** shall mean a full time research scholar except that he receives complete financial support from the sponsoring organization i.e. his employer.
- **“Supervisor”** shall mean a faculty member of the University/Affiliated Institute/ College or any other person approved by the Research Board on the recommendation of the Department Research Committee to supervise the research work of a research scholar.
- **“University”** shall mean the Career Point University, Kota, Rajasthan.

3. Eligibility For Admission

An applicant possessing the following qualifications in appropriate areas shall be eligible to apply for admission to PhD programme of the respective disciplines of University:

3.1 Candidates who have completed:

- A 1-year/2-semester master's degree programme after a 4-year/8-semester bachelor's degree programme or a 2-year/4-semester master's degree programme after a 3-year bachelor's degree programme or qualifications declared equivalent to the master's degree by the corresponding statutory regulatory body, with at least 55% marks in aggregate or its equivalent grade in a point scale wherever grading system is followed or equivalent qualification from a foreign educational institution accredited by an assessment and accreditation agency which is approved, recognized or authorized by an authority, established or incorporated under a law in its home country or any other statutory authority in that country to assess, accredit or assure quality and standards of the educational institution.
- A relaxation of 5% marks or its equivalent grade may be allowed for those belonging to SC/ST/OBC (non-creamy layer)/Differently-Abled, Economically Weaker Section (EWS) and other categories of candidates as per the decision of the Commission from time to time.
- A candidate seeking admission after a 4-year/8-semester bachelor's degree programme should have a minimum of 75% marks in aggregate or its equivalent grade on a point scale wherever the grading system is followed. A relaxation of 5% marks or its equivalent grade may be allowed for those belonging to SC/ST/OBC (non-creamy layer)/Differently-Abled, Economically Weaker Section (EWS) and other categories of candidates as per the decision of the Commission from time to time.
- Candidates who have completed the M.Phil. programme with at least 55% marks in aggregate or its equivalent grade in a point scale wherever grading system is followed or equivalent qualification from a foreign educational institution accredited by an assessment and accreditation agency which is approved, recognized or authorized by an authority, established or incorporated under a law in its home country or any other statutory authority in that country to assess, accredit or assure quality and standards of educational institutions, shall be eligible for admission to the Ph.D. programme. A relaxation of 5% marks or its equivalent grade may be allowed for those belonging to SC/ST/OBC (non-creamy layer)/Differently-Abled, Economically Weaker Section (EWS) and other categories of candidates as per the decision of the Commission from time to time.

4. Duration Of Ph.D. Programme

- Ph.D. programme shall be for a minimum duration of three years, including coursework, and a maximum duration of six (6) years from the date of admission to the Ph.D. programme.

- A maximum of an additional two (2) years can be given through a process of re-registration as per the Statute/Ordinance of the University; provided, however, that the total period for completion of a Ph.D. programme should not exceed eight (8) years from the date of admission in the Ph.D. programme. Provided further that, female Ph.D. scholars and Persons with Disabilities (having more than 40% disability) may be allowed an additional relaxation of two (2) years; however, the total period for completion of a Ph.D. programme in such cases should not exceed ten (10) years from the date of admission in the Ph.D. programme.
- Female Ph.D. Scholars may be provided Maternity Leave/Child Care Leave for up to 240 days in the entire duration of the Ph.D. programme.

5. Procedure For Admission

Admission to the Ph.D. programme shall be made using the following methods:

- The admission shall be based on the entrance test conducted by the university. The entrance test will be conducted in the subjects where the vacant seats are available.
- A candidate shall be permitted for admission/registration in a faculty in which he/she has obtained the Master's degree or four (4) years/ Eighth(8) semester bachelor's degree programme (with research).
- International Students will be exempted from the Ph.D. Entrance Test. However, they will have to appear in an interview. The Interview Board will take the final decision for the admission of such students.
- The Entrance Test syllabus shall consist of 50% of research methodology and 50% shall be subject-specific.
- The syllabus for the entrance test will be available on the university website.
- Students who have secured 50% marks in the entrance test are eligible to be called for the interview.
- A relaxation of 5 % marks will be allowed in the entrance examination for the candidates belonging to SC/ST/OBC/differently-abled category, Economically Weaker Section (EWS), and other categories of candidates as per the decision of the government from time to time.
- Validity of the test: The candidate qualifying the test would be eligible to be invited for the interview.
- The University will decide the number of eligible students to be called for an interview based on the number of Ph.D. seats available.
- The test will be only for judging the eligibility of the candidate for Ph.D. programme. Qualifying the eligibility test will not ensure that the candidate will necessarily be registered as a Ph.D. student.
- The candidates declared qualified in the entrance test and the candidates exempted from entrance test both would be invited for an interview to be conducted by a panel of experts constituted by Dean (Research). At the time of interview by the expert panel, the candidate is expected to discuss his/her research interests. The candidate would have to produce the original documents at the time of interview. After the entrance test and interview the merit would be prepared on the basis of the prescribed calculation.

- The number of students, who shall be admitted to the Ph.D. programme, shall be decided by the University. The University shall follow the reservation and other rules in granting such admissions.

6. Supervisor

6.1 Allocation of Research Supervisor

- Permanent faculty members working as Professor/Associate Professor of the Higher Educational Institution with a Ph.D., and at least five research publications in peer-reviewed or refereed journals and permanent faculty members working as Assistant Professors in Higher Educational Institutions with a Ph.D., and at least three research publications in peer-reviewed or refereed journals may be recognized as a Research Supervisor in the university where the faculty member is employed or in its affiliated Post-graduate Colleges/institutes. Such recognized research supervisors cannot supervise research scholars in other institutions, where they can only act as co-supervisors. Ph.D. awarded by a university under the supervision of a faculty member who is not an employee of the university or its affiliated Post-graduate Colleges/institutes would be in violation of these Regulations.
- For Ph.D. scholars working in Central government/ State government research institutions whose degrees are given by Higher Educational Institutions, the scientists in such research institutions who are equivalent to Professor/Associate Professor/Assistant Professor can be recognized as supervisors if they fulfill the above requirements.
- Provided that in areas/disciplines where there is no, or only a limited number of peer-reviewed or refereed journals, the Higher Educational Institution may relax the above condition for recognition of a person as Research Supervisor with reasons recorded in writing.
- Co-Supervisors from within the same department or other departments of the same institution or other institutions may be permitted with the approval of the competent authority.
- Adjunct Faculty members shall not act as Research Supervisors and can only act as co-supervisors.
- In case of interdisciplinary/multidisciplinary research work, if required, a Co-Supervisor from outside the Department/School/Centre/College/University may be appointed.
- An eligible Professor/Associate Professor/Assistant Professor can guide up to eight (8) / six (6) / four (4) Ph.D. scholars, respectively, at any given time.
- In case of relocation of a female Ph.D. scholar due to marriage or otherwise, the research data shall be allowed to be transferred to the Higher Educational Institution to which the scholar intends to relocate, provided all the other conditions in these Regulations are followed, and the research work does not pertain to a project sanctioned to the parent Institution/Supervisor by any funding agency. Such scholars shall, however, give due credit to the parent institution and the supervisor for the part of research already undertaken.

- Faculty members with less than three years of service before superannuation shall not be allowed to take new research scholars under their supervision. However, such faculty members can continue to supervise Ph.D. scholars who are already registered until superannuation and as a co-supervisor after superannuation, but not after attaining the age of 70 years.

6.2 Supervisor proceeding on long leave for more than twelve months

- Where more than one supervisor exists, the supervisor proceeding on long leave for more than twelve months can continue to be a supervisor, provided the supervisor existed for more than eighteen months.
- Where only one supervisor exists, another supervisor may be recommended to be appointed by the RAC in cases where a student has not yet submitted his synopsis.
- If the synopsis of the thesis has been submitted before the supervisor proceeds on leave, he will continue to be the supervisor and only a caretaker supervisor will be appointed.
- If the thesis has been submitted before the supervisor proceeds on leave, he will continue to be the supervisor and only a caretaker supervisor will be appointed.
- Further, if a major revision becomes necessary, and the sole supervisor is on leave, he should be asked to specifically state whether he would effectively help the student carry out the major revisions within a reasonable period. In case the sole supervisor expresses his inability due to one reason or the other, the caretaker supervisor, if he provides the required help in carrying out the major revision, will automatically be treated as a co-supervisor of that research scholar.
- If a supervisor proceeds on leave for a period less than 12 months initially, but later extends his leave beyond 12 months, the procedure will be followed.
- **A Supervisor retires:** A faculty member who is due to retire within the next two years can be appointed as a co-supervisor and can continue to be the co-supervisor even after his retirement provided the RAC is convinced of his availability / continued guidance to the student. In other cases, a faculty member on retirement may continue as a supervisor/ co-supervisor, if reemployed or appointed as Emeritus Fellow; or, Honorary Professor; or, if the synopsis of the thesis has been submitted. Appointment of another Supervisor, if necessary, will be followed.
- **A Supervisor resigns:** A new Supervisor will be appointed, if necessary, as per norms of the supervisor.
- **A Supervisor die:** A new Supervisor will be appointed, if necessary, by the Research Board on the recommendation of the RAC.

6.3 Limit for Supervising Research Scholar by Supervisors

The maximum number of students, which a supervisor can take for research work under his/her supervision, shall be as follows:-

1. Professor- 08
2. Associate Professor - 06
3. Assistant Professor -04

International students registered with a research supervisor will not be counted in his/her quota. However, their number will be limited to two at a time.

7. Admission of International students in Ph.D. programme: Each supervisor can guide up to two international research scholars on a supernumerary basis over and above the permitted number of Ph.D. scholars. At any point, the total number of Ph.D. scholars under a faculty member, either as a supervisor or a co-supervisor, shall not exceed the number prescribed in clause 6.3.

8. Coursework: After having been admitted to the Ph.D. programme, each student shall be required to undertake course work for a minimum period of one semester.

- The Credit requirement for the Ph.D. coursework is a minimum of 12 credits, including a “Research and Publication Ethics” course as notified by UGC vide D.O. No. F.1- 1/2018(Journal/CARE) in 2019 and a research methodology course. The Research Advisory Committee can also recommend UGC recognized online courses as part of the credit requirements for the Ph.D. programme.
- All Ph.D. scholars, irrespective of discipline, shall be required to train in teaching /education /pedagogy/writing related to their chosen Ph.D. subject during their doctoral period. Ph.D. scholars may also be assigned 4-6 hours per week of teaching/research assistantship for conducting tutorial or laboratory work and evaluations.
- A Ph.D. scholar must obtain a minimum of 55% marks or its equivalent grade in the UGC 10-point scale in the course work to be eligible to continue in the programme and submit his or her thesis.

9. Departmental Research Committee(DRC)

The Vice Chancellor shall constitute a Departmental Research Committee (DRC) for each PhD programme on the recommendation of Dean (Research). The term of all the members including Chairperson shall be three years. In the absence of Chairperson, the next senior most member shall Chair the meeting.

The DRC shall consist of following members:

- Chairman-Dean/HoD
- Convener-Research Supervisor
- 2 Subject’s Expert
- Dean, Research

10. Research Board/ Research Advisory Committee (RAC)

As per University Grants Commission (Minimum Standards and Procedures for the award of Ph.D. Degree) Regulations, 2022 and the University Act 2012 (State Act No. 13 of 2012). The Research Advisory Committee (RAC)/Research Board for a Ph.D. scholar shall be constituted as follows:

- President/Dean/Head of the Department of respective Department or his/her nominee-Chairperson
- Dean, Research
- Maximum two experts nominated by the Vice-Chancellor
- Supervisor-Convener
- Co-Supervisor(s) (if any)
- Director, IQAC
- Registrar-Member Secretary

The supervisor of the respective Ph.D. scholar shall be the convener of the Research Advisory Committee and the Co-Supervisor (if any) shall be the Joint Convener.

10.1 Functions of the Research Advisory Committee

- To review the research proposal and finalize the topic and title of research.
- To guide the research scholar to develop the study design and methodology of research and identify the course(s) that he/she may have to undergo.
- To periodically review and assist in the progress of the research work of the research scholar.
- Each semester, a Ph.D. scholar shall appear before the Research Advisory Committee to make a presentation and submit a brief report on the progress of his/her work for evaluation and further guidance. The Research Advisory Committee shall submit its recommendations along with a copy of Ph.D. scholar's progress report to the Higher Educational Institution concerned. A copy of such recommendations shall also be provided to the Ph.D. scholar.
- In case the progress of the Ph.D. scholar is unsatisfactory, the Research Advisory Committee shall record the reasons for the same and suggest corrective measures. If the Ph.D. scholar fails to implement these corrective measures, the Research Advisory Committee may recommend, with specific reasons, the cancellation of the registration of the Ph.D. scholar from the Ph.D. programme.

11. Evaluation and Assessment Methods, minimum standards/credits for award of the degree etc.-

- Upon satisfactory completion of course work and obtaining the marks/grade prescribed in clause (3) of Regulation 9 above, the Ph.D. scholar shall be required to undertake research work and produce a draft dissertation/thesis.
- Before submitting the dissertation/thesis, the Ph.D. scholar shall make a presentation before the Research Advisory Committee of the Higher Educational Institution concerned, which shall also be open to all faculty members and other research scholars/students.
- The Higher Educational Institution concerned shall have a mechanism using well-developed software applications to detect Plagiarism in research work and the research integrity shall be an integral part of all the research activities leading to the award of a Ph.D. degree.
- A Ph.D. scholar shall submit the thesis for evaluation; along with (a) an undertaking from the Ph.D. scholar that there is no plagiarism and (b) a certificate from the

Research Supervisor attesting to the originality of the thesis and that the thesis has not been submitted for the award of any other degree/diploma to any other Higher Educational Institution.

- The Ph.D. thesis submitted by a Ph.D. scholar shall be evaluated by his/her Research Supervisor and at least two external examiners who are experts in the field and not in employment of the Higher Educational Institution concerned. Such examiner(s) should be academics with a good record of scholarly publications in the field. Wherever possible, one of the external examiners should be chosen from outside India. The viva-voce board shall consist of the Research Supervisor and at least one of the two external examiners and may be conducted online. The viva-voce shall be open to the members of the Research Advisory Committee/faculty members/research scholars, and students. Higher Educational Institutions may formulate appropriate rules/ordinances to effect the provisions of this Regulation.
- The viva-voce of the Ph.D. scholar to defend the thesis shall be conducted if both the external examiners recommend acceptance of the thesis after incorporating any corrections suggested by them. If one of the external examiners recommends rejection, the Higher Educational Institution concerned shall send the thesis to an alternate external examiner from the approved panel of examiners, and the viva-voce examination shall be held only if the alternate examiner recommends acceptance of the thesis. If the alternate examiner does not recommend acceptance of the thesis, the thesis shall be rejected, and the Ph.D. scholar shall be declared ineligible for the award of a Ph.D.
- The Higher Educational Institution concerned shall complete the entire process of evaluating a Ph. D. thesis, including the declaration of the viva-voce result, within a period of six (6) months from the date of submission of the thesis.

12. Ph.D. through Part-time Mode

- Ph.D. programme through part-time mode will be permitted, provided all the conditions stipulated in these Regulations are fulfilled.
- The Higher Educational Institution concerned shall obtain a “No Objection Certificate” through the candidate for a part-time Ph.D. programme from the appropriate authority in the organization where the candidate is employed, clearly stating that:
 - The candidate is permitted to pursue studies on a part-time basis.
 - His/her official duties permit him/her to devote sufficient time for research.
 - If required, he/she will be relieved from the duty to complete the course work.
- Notwithstanding anything contained in these Regulations or any other law, for the time being in force, no Higher Educational Institution or research institution of the Central government or a State Government shall conduct Ph.D. programmes through distance and/or online mode.

13. Thesis Submission

Every person who joins a University Teaching Department or a Post Graduate College

or any other Research Centre of the University for carrying out research after being registered by the University of Ph.D. Degree, shall be required to submit following documents required at the time of submission of the Ph.D. thesis:

- Thesis Submission Application
- Evidence of Research Publications in Refereed International/National Journal (at least two research papers) including UGC Care-I and Peer Reviewed Refereed Journals. It should be based on the Research Scholar and Research Supervisor/Co-Research Supervisor(with name & affiliations) only
- Evidence of Paper Presentations in International and National Conferences / Seminars (at least two presentations)
- Pre-Ph.D. Presentation Report {Duly signed by Research Scholar and Research Supervisor(s)}
- Softcopy of the Plagiarism Verification Report (in a single pdf file) as per UGC rules and regulations and it should be less than 10% that will be accepted.
- Hardcopy of the Plagiarism Verification Report {Duly signed by Research Scholar and Research Supervisor(s)} and should be generated by the Plagiarism Detection Software as per standards of the UGC.
- Softcopy of the Ph.D. Thesis (in the single pdf and doc files)
- Hard bound Five Copies of the Ph.D. Thesis {Duly signed by Research Scholar and Research Supervisor(s)}

14. Condition For Award Of Ph.D. Degree

14.1 Merit the award of Ph.D. degree:

- It should be a piece of research work characterized either by the findings of new facts or by a fresh approach towards interpretation of facts and theories.
- It should reflect the candidate's capacity for critical examination and judgment.
- It should be satisfactory in its literary presentation.

14.2 Viva-Voce Examination

- A Viva-Voce examination, to be conducted by one of the external examiners and the supervisor, shall be held in all cases which shall be open to the Dean of the Faculty concerned, the teachers of the subject concerned in the University department, constituent/affiliated colleges and other Research Centers of the University, if any, and the Research Scholars in the Department/Subject concerned, who all may attend viva-voce examination at their own expenses. Except the examiner no one shall be entitled to ask any question.
- The viva-voce panel shall consist of the Research Supervisor and at least one of the two external examiners and may be conducted online. The viva-voce shall be open to the members of the Research Advisory Committee/faculty members/research scholars, and students. Higher Educational Institutions may formulate appropriate rules/ordinances to effect the provisions of this Regulations.

- If the original examiners are not available or not give consent to conduct viva within 6 months from the date of intimation by the University, another person from within the country may be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor.
- The examiners shall send their reports independently to the Dean, Research by the name marked 'Confidential'.
- If in the first instance, all the examiners evaluating the thesis as well as those conducting the viva-voce examination recommended the award of degree to the candidate, the degree shall be awarded.
- If the majority of the examiners recommend rejection of the thesis, the thesis shall be rejected.
- In case of divergence of opinion among the examiners not covered under clauses(s) above, following procedure shall be followed:-
 - If one of the examiners has suggested revision or rejection of the thesis, whereas others have accepted it, the thesis shall be referred to a third external examiner and his/her recommendation shall be final.
 - If one of the examiners has rejected the thesis, another has asked for its revision while the third examiner has accepted it, the thesis shall be rejected. When the thesis is rejected under such circumstances, the candidate can get himself registered on the same subject.
 - If both the external examiners recommend revision of the thesis, the thesis shall be revised.
 - If the candidate fails to satisfy the viva-voce examiners or if there is a divergence of the opinion between the viva-voce examiners, the candidate may be allowed to appear at a second viva-voce examination on payment of the required fee, to be held not later than one year from the date of the first viva-voce examination. If at the second viva-voce examination, the candidate fails to satisfy the examiners, his/her thesis shall be finally rejected.
 - The Higher Educational Institution concerned shall complete the entire process of evaluating a Ph. D. thesis, including the declaration of the viva-voce result, within a period of six (6) months from the date of submission of the thesis.

15. Re-Submission Of Thesis

- If a candidate is permitted to improve and re-submit his/her thesis, he shall be required to submit it not earlier than six months and not later than twelve months from the date of such permission, along with the required fee.
- The thesis so re-submitted shall be sent to the same panel of examiners including the third external examiner, if any, who evaluated the original one, for adjudication unless they or any of them expresses inability to adjudicate. The Vice Chancellor shall appoint in such contingency another external examiner or examiners, as the case may be, from the original panel suggested by the supervisor.
- The thesis shall be accepted if at least two external examiners and the supervisor recommend its acceptance.

16. Withdrawal From Phd Programme

If a research scholar withdraws from his PhD programme or his registration is terminated, his research scholar status ceases. If such a research scholar is readmitted within a period of six years, he/she may be given weightage to the credits acquired during the previous registration on the recommendation of RAC, except in the case of termination on disciplinary grounds.

17. Depository With UGC INFLIBNET

- Following the successful completion of the evaluation process and announcement of the award of Ph.D. the University shall submit a soft copy of the Ph.D. thesis to the UGC for hosting the same in INFLIBNET, accessible to all Institutions/Universities.
- Along with the Degree, the University shall issue a Provisional Certificate certifying to the effect that the Degree has been awarded in accordance with the provisions of the Regulations of the UGC.

18. Revocation of Degree

The University shall have the power to revoke any Ph.D. degree conferred duly if the candidate is subsequently proved guilty of plagiarism, falsification / copying of data / information or any other form of academic or ethical malpractice. The decision of the Governing Board of the Career Point University, Kota shall be final.
